Thanks to an unexpected and sizeable bequest, and receipt of several grants within the past few months, the library is now able to apply for a matching \$500,000 grant from Pennsylvania's Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund. We are optimistic about the library's chances for receiving this grant, and will be preparing for a groundbreaking this spring as soon as the ground thaws. Grant awards are expected to be announced in February.

Please wish us the best of luck. The grant, combined with all private donations received to date, will allow the library addition to be done properly, fulfilling not only our current space needs, but with an eye to the future.

Now that fall is here, we are moving ahead with additional projects.

- I have applied for a grant to hopefully re-design the library's website, keeping it simple and functional, but with a more attractive appearance.
- Chris Appleby, who helps out every week at the library preparing new books, we plan to hold a genealogy program October 24th, from 1:00-2:30. In addition to discussing the ins and outs of genealogy research, Chris and I will be explaining the library's version of ancestry.com, which is significantly different than the commercial version.
- We have upcoming plans for the library to offer very basic computer classes. Still in development, these classes will let people who are just starting to

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1,000 Children & Caregivers Enjoyed the EPL Summer Reading Program

The theme of the Emmaus Public Library Summer Reading Club was **On Your Mark, Get Set... Read!** , with each child asked to read (or have read to them) ten hours over the summer.

We launched the summer reading program by visiting all of the East Penn School District elementary schools with Lisa Underwood from Lower Macungie Library to encourage everyone to become involved.

We had a good turn-out with **366 children** from infant to 18 years, who enjoyed **2,457 hours of reading.**

The summer opened on an international note with performer **Mary Roth** playing a bohdran (Celtic drum) and hammer dulcimer and leading children and parents in song and chants from around the world on Monday, June 20^{th.}

A July program, donated by **Mari Gruber (The Butterfly Lady)**, allowed families to learn the life cycle of butterflies and their importance in our local ecosystem.

The final large program was *Birds in Flight*, on Saturday, August 20th, presented by **Phung T. Luu** of Animal Behavior and Conservation Connections of Delaware, which showed a hawk, owls, parrots, a toucan, and a hornbill to delighted viewers. All three programs involved audience volunteers.

The Friends played a large part in the entire summer program – providing funds for incentives, supplies, and programming, and for some, volunteering at the desk, where they were directly involved in keeping track of the children's hours.

This year's additional funding of summer reading allowed us to purchase enough carefully chosen prizes to reward every child who read to their goals, as well as pay for some spectacular programs – we had well over 200 people in the audience outside for *Birds in Flight*.

Other, smaller, programs included storytimes, block parties, movies, board games, a yoga demonstration, **author Phyllis Palomaro** reading her Farmer Bonnie books, the **Emmaus Hockey Club**, a birthday party for Harry Potter, and an obedience demonstration by the **Lehigh Valley Therapy Dogs**, who also were here for their monthly **Books and Barks**. By the end of August, over 1,000 children and caregivers took part in the summer reading program.

It was a busy summer with a lot of good reading.

The Emmaus community is fortunate to have in our midst a talented writer and director of film and theater who is generous about sharing her knowledge and love of the craft.

Stephanie Gardner will curate a fall series of free Wednesday night screenings called "Everyone Needs a Little Laughter." A graduate of Emmaus High School, Stephanie

received her MFA in Dramatic Writing from New York University's Tisch School of the Arts, Asia. A free-lance filmmaker and playwright, her past clients include Elie Wiesel, Yale University, Urban Stages, Miller Symphony Hall and the Allentown JazzFest.

Says Stephanie about the film series: "There is already so much tragedy filling up our daily news, domestically and abroad, that I decided to lighten things up for the fall, to remind ourselves, that there is as much (if not more) goodness than sadness in the world, and sometimes, yes, 'everyone needs a little laughter.'

"September 28 brings *Minnie and Moskowitz* one of my favorite quirky romantic comedies from the quintessential American independent art-house filmmaker, John Cassettes. Most of his films strike a dark, domestic dramatic tone, however, this gem from 1971 has a lighthearted romantic feel while still exploring the psyches of vulnerable individuals.

"October 26 screens *Annie Hall*, Woody Allen's 1977 classic, and one of the only film comedies to ever win an Oscar for Best Picture.

"November 16 brings *After Hours*, a laugh-out-loud comedy from 1985, created by an individual not usually known for comedy, Martin Scorsese. This film is silly and fun and anyone who's ever been caught in a surreal situation in New York City will appreciate it!

"We close the series on **December 21** with Wes Anderson's 2012 film, **Moonrise Kingdom.** As most of the films curated here have been from earlier decades, I wanted to show something more recent, and "Moonrise Kingdom" feels perfect for the end of year season, as it is heartwarming, fun, and colorful. "

The programs take place at 6:30 p.m. in the Margaret Knoll Gardner Room of the Emmaus Public Library. Stephanie introduces each session, providing context for the film about to be seen, and facilitates post-screening discussions. This is a don't miss series for those who love learning about movies.

More about Stephanie Gardner: Stephanie has participated in masterclasses and screenwriting workshops where she wrote and developed feature screenplays under the tutelage of Oliver Stone (Platoon), Todd Solondz (Happiness), Richard Wesley (Uptown Saturday Night), and Sabrina Dhawan (Monsoon Wedding).
